School Visit from PC Jack Hewitt

On Monday 4th April we had a visit from PC Jack Hewitt. He came into school to discuss the work that he does and the impact that it has on the local community.

What is your job title? Police Constable.

Do you wear a uniform? I do but there are other officers who don't.

What hours do you work? We work shifts-early 7am—4pm and late 3pm—12am.

How much do you get paid? The top wage for a PC is £40,000. Which you can earn after 8 years in the job.

Have you been assaulted in your job? Not yet. I like to talk to people. I have been spat at on a couple of occasions.

Have you ever used a taser? Not yet. As a student officer, I have to apply for a taser license. I carry irritant spray, baton and restraints.

Have you been in a police chase? I had an unsuccessful one this week! We had a dog unit with us. I knocked on the door, the male ran away and jumped over a high wall. Unfortunately, we then couldn't find him. However, all units are now aware of him and we will find him.

What events have you been a police officer at? I was an officer at the G7 Summit in Cornwall. I was security for President Biden although I only saw him once!







Forest School Diary

January– The first frog spawn and lots of cold weather.

February– We watched the frog spawn develop and hatch. We noticed that something had been eating the frogs. We set up the wildlife camera and photographed an otter, saw a deer on site and lots of buzzards!

March-planting trees across the long meadow to create a wildlife corridor. The trees (Crab apple, rowan, hazel, downy birch, blackthorn, hawthorn, oak and silver birch) were from the Woodland Trust and are native species which will provide cover for wildlife as well as food. We have heard woodpeckers and increased bird activity, seen bees, oil beetles, spring time flowers and leaves emerging.

Students have participated in the following activities: built and put up bird and hedgehog boxes; built steps and a bridge to make access easier; redirected water to the pond to help with water levels; observed the life cycle of tadpoles and the onset of Spring; rebuilt the cob rocket stove for cooking and built dens.

Having conversations without judgement

Whether by playing games, watching videos, or doing things your child enjoys, spending time together online is a great way to start conversations about the online world and how they're finding being a part of it. It is important to ask questions and take an interest in what your child enjoys online.

An essential part of having this open dialogue is to not judge, even if their behaviour or life online isn't what you wanted or expected. This ensures that your child feels they can come to you if ever they make a mistake or experience a problem online.

• Knowing where you can learn more about their favourite apps and games

Websites like Common Sense Media or The Family Gaming Database can be invaluable sources of information. When your child starts talking about a new game or app, why not do some research into the reporting and blocking options available? Then you can help your child if they come to you with an issue.

Getting support if things go wrong

There are lots of organisations who are there to support you and your family if something has gone wrong. The <u>Report Harmful Content website</u> can help you with issues such as cyberbullying, impersonation and threats. You can report worrying behaviour towards children to <u>CEOP</u>. • Reassuring your child that whatever happens online, you are there to support them

Let your child know that the best way to address any problem they have online, is to tell a trusted adult immediately. For example, this might include someone sending them a friend request; an online message; telling them to visit a specific website, or app; or asking them for their personal information. Reassure them that if anything happens online that they are unsure about, or makes them feel worried or upset, they can come to you for help.
